



Maternal and Newborn Health is a program designed to influence the government to provide better services for mothers and babies in slum communities. We work with women in Mumbai communities to ensure they access

health care.

Our work has produced immense impacts on the neonatal mortality rates and has resulted in improved referrals to peripheral hospitals (from 38 % - 60%) thus reducing load on tertiary health services.



Prevention of Violence against Women and Children Program aims to provide crisis intervention to women and children facing violence in their immediate environment. We also work with those who face problems due to their

sexual orientation, disability or occupation.

We work in Dharavi, Santacruz and Mankhurd.

The testimonies of 75% of our clients have indicated improved health and enhanced family relationships after our interventions.



Child Health and Nutrition Program aims to reduce malnutrition in children in Mumbai slum communities, via the cycle of prevention, early identification and treatment by improving feeding practices of young children amongst mothers and

establishing Day Care Centres where severely malnourished children are treated.

60 Anganwadis mapped to date, approximately 4000 children under 3 identified as malnourished. 70 severely malnourished children referred to Nutrition Rehabilitation centre during screening process.



Sexual and Reproductive Health

Program aims to empower adolescents and married women in urban slums with the right information and skills that enable them to make informed decisions about their sexual and

reproductive health and their family size. We work in Dharavi, Ghatkopar and Kandivali.

Over 1800 girls and boys have completed training, demonstrating change in knowledge, attitude, skills and safe practices. Use of modern family planning spacing methods increased from 12% to 30% in 1½ years in Rajiv Gandhi Nagar, Dharavi.

Research at SNEHA

SNEHA CENTRE

A generous five year research grant from Wellcome Trust was awarded to SNEHA and Dr. David Osrin, Wellcome Trust Senior Research Associate and Reader, University College London, as his senior fellowship.

This cluster randomized controlled trial is to test the impact of running SNEHA centres in vulnerable slums of Mumbai. These slums are hubs and instruments of change in the defined community they would serve. The area selection, model design and evaluation have been finalized.

The intervention has been rolled out in the extremely vulnerable poorest and largest slum population with the worst health indicators in the city, the M/East ward of Mumbai. Ethical approval has been received from the Multi Institutional Ethics.

Round table discussion - EQUINAM

'Learning from stakeholders for health equity' was conducted on 24th April'2012 in Mumbai. Under the aegis of the New ideas Initiative, as part of the Equinam project which is a collaboration between SNEHA, University College London and partners across India, Bangladesh, Nepal and Malawi. Supported by the Economic and Social Research Council - Department of international Development (ESRC-DFID), which works towards achieving equitable improvements in newborn and maternal health.

The aim is to build on others' experiences of what works best to reach lower socioeconomic groups and reduce health inequalities. The round table brought together a healthy mix of expert practitioners, senior academicians' and medical experts to exchange ideas and evidence on how to achieve inclusive development and reduce health inequalities.

Quiltessentially SNEHA

One of the visitors commented" SNEHA quilts brought back to me my childhood. Just like the quilted blankets put together by my granny in the village. It's a warmth that no blanket can give"

The SNEHA livelihood project that was conceptualized and initiated in the October of 2009 aims to teach women from the adjoining slums a variety of skills and also provide them with gainful employment. What began as a pilot project as a way to empower women has now become a full-time livelihood program that is bringing ever increasing publicity to SNEHA.

Started with pooled fabric donations from well-wishers the quilts project is growing from just an idea into a full-fledged initiative. SNEHA has showcased at corporate houses and in cooperative housing societies. The product range created by the women from vulnerable communities includes bags, table linen, curtains and floor throws. The quilts are the mainstay and each is unique. The patchwork embodies what SNEHA stands for i.e. weaving together of lives and communities in the areas they serve.

The program expects to scale up considerably in 2012, increasing the number of women employed widening the product set, opening new premises at Dharavi and introducing new skills to the women.
